

PASTORS COLUMN

THE GREAT JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY DECEMBER 8, 2015 UNTIL NOVEMBER 20, 2016



On Divine Mercy Sunday, April 11, 2015, our Holy Father Pope Francis announced a Great Jubilee Year of Mercy for the Church. With these opening words, “Jesus Christ is the face of the Father’s mercy”, Pope Francis in the document, *Misericordiae Vultus*, explains why the Year of Mercy will begin on December 8th, “I have chosen the date of 8 December because of its rich meaning in the recent history of the Church. In fact, I will open the Holy Door on the fiftieth anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council. The Church feels a great need to keep this event alive. With the Council, the Church entered a new phase of her history. The Council Fathers strongly perceived, as a true breath of the Holy Spirit, a need to talk about God to men and women of their time in a more accessible way. The walls which for too long had made the Church a kind of fortress were torn down and the time had come to proclaim the Gospel in a new way.

It was a new phase of the same evangelization that had existed from the beginning. It was a fresh undertaking for all Christians to bear witness to their faith with greater enthusiasm and conviction. The Church sensed a responsibility to be a living sign of the Father’s love in the world.”

On December 8th, a holyday of obligation, as we honor the Immaculate Conception, patroness of our nation, we will also celebrate the beginning of the Great Jubilee Year of Mercy. In particular, I would ask as many as possible to come to the evening Mass that day. While Masses, God willing, will be offered at 8:30 AM and Noon, Mass will also be offered for the Opening of the Year of Mercy at 7 PM that evening. Afterwards, for those who would have the opportunity to stay, I will offer a teaching and insight on the Holy Father's writings in *Misericordiae Vultus*, so that we may understand the focus of the Great Jubilee Year of Mercy. During the course of the Year of Mercy several programs and gatherings have been planned for our parish. I am sure that there will also be diocesan celebrations and events also.

In presenting the opportunities planned for this Year of Mercy I echo the words of the Holy Father who wrote in *Misericordiae Vultus*, “I present, therefore, this Extraordinary Jubilee Year dedicated to living out in our daily lives the mercy which the Father constantly extends to all of us. In this Jubilee Year, let us allow God to surprise us. He never tires of casting open the doors of his heart and of repeating that he loves us and wants to share his love with us. The Church feels the urgent need to proclaim God’s mercy. Her life is authentic and credible only when she becomes a convincing herald of mercy. She knows that her primary task, especially at a moment full of great hopes and signs of contradiction, is to introduce everyone to the great mystery of God’s mercy by contemplating the face of Christ. The Church is called above all to be a credible witness to mercy, professing it and living it as the core of the revelation of Jesus Christ. From the heart of the Trinity, from the depths of the mystery of God, the great river of mercy wells up and overflows unceasingly. It is a spring that will never run dry, no matter how many people draw from it. Every time someone is in need, he or she can approach it, because the mercy of God never ends. The profundity of the mystery surrounding it is as inexhaustible as the richness which springs up from it. In this Jubilee Year, may the Church echo the word of God that resounds strong and clear as a message and a sign of pardon, strength, aid, and love. May she never tire of extending mercy, and be ever patient in offering compassion and comfort. May the Church become the voice of every man and woman, and repeat confidently without end: “Be mindful of your mercy, O Lord, and your steadfast love, for they have been from of old” (*Ps 25:6*).”

SAINT OF THE MONTH

St. Gertrude Feast Day – November 16

Gertrude was born on the feast of the Epiphany, January 6, 1256, in Eisleben, Germany. At the age of four, she entered the monastery of St. Mary at Helfta under the direction of its abbess, Gertrude of Hackeborn.

Gertrude joined the monastic community in 1266. It is clear from her own writings that she received a comprehensive education in a range of subjects. She was thoroughly familiar with scripture as well as the writings of the Fathers of the Church such as Augustine and Gregory the Great.

In 1281, at the age of twenty-five, she experienced the first of a series of sacred visions that continued throughout her life, and which changed its course. Her priorities shifted away from secular knowledge and toward the study of Scripture and theology. Gertrude devoted herself strongly to personal prayer and meditation, and began writing spiritual treatises for the benefit of her monastic sisters. She became one of the great mystics of the 13th century.

Gertrude produced numerous writings, though only some, including parts of *The Herald of Divine Love* and her collection of *Spiritual Exercises*, survive today. One of the most esteemed woman saints, she was a notable early devotee of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Her *Herald* is distinguished within the history of Christian devotion because its vivid descriptions of Gertrude's visions show a considerable insight into the veneration of the Sacred Heart. Philip Neri and Francis de Sales both used her prayers and recommended them to others.

Pope Benedict XIV gave her the title "the Great" to distinguish her from Abbess Gertrude of Hackeborn and to recognize the depth of her spiritual and theological insight. Gertrude showed "tender sympathy towards the souls in purgatory" and urged prayers for them. She is therefore invoked for the suffering souls in purgatory.

Gertrude died at Helfta, near her birthplace around 1302. Her feast day is celebrated on November 16. She is the Patroness of the West Indies.
