PASTORS COLUMN

Mass Etiquette

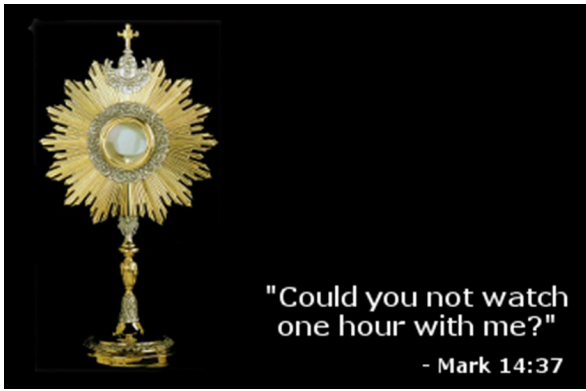
We have an awesome privilege each time we are drawn by the Holy Spirit to worship and adore God at Mass. As a priest it is the greatest privilege of my life and the essence of each day. Just as in many families there are times when it is good that we be reminded of the gift we have and how we are expected to respond to that gift the following is offered for our **collective** attention.

- 1. Fast before Mass.** It is Church law that we fast for 1 hour before receiving Holy Communion. Water and medicine may be consumed, of course. The purpose is to help us prepare to receive Jesus in the Eucharist.
- 2. No food or drink in Church.** The exceptions would be a drink for small children, water for the priest or choir (if discreet) and water for those who are ill.
- 4. Don't chew gum in church.** It breaks your fast, it's distracting, it is considered impolite in a formal setting, and it doesn't help us pray better. Never receive Holy Communion with gum in your mouth.
- 5. Make the Sign of the Cross on yourself with Holy Water on entering and leaving the church.** This is a reminder of our Baptism, which made us members of Christ's Church. Try to be mindful of what is happening when you do so and say a prayer thanking God for your life in Christ.
- 6. Dress modestly and appropriately.** Wear your Sunday best. As Catholics we believe that God comes down to meet us at every Mass. So, why would we not dress up?
- 7. Show up at least a few minutes early.** Please try to be on time for Mass! Sometimes things can't be helped, without doubt -- cars break down, babies need changing, alarm clocks fail to go off -- but chronic lateness for the Mass is rude and disruptive. Getting to Mass early allows you to pray and prepare yourself better for Mass.
- 8. Cell phones should never be used in Mass for calls or texting.** The exceptions are emergencies and if you do use one, please walk out of church to do so.
- 9. When we enter and leave Church, genuflect toward the Tabernacle.** Christ is present for our sake. By allowing our right knee to hit the floor, we acknowledge He is our Lord and God. If someone is physically unable to genuflect, then a bow is sufficient. During Mass, if you pass in front of the altar or tabernacle, bow reverently.
- 10. Please avoid unnecessary chatter in church.** Once you enter the worship space -- it is not the time or place to visit with those around you. If you must talk do so as quietly and briefly as possible. Remember that your conversation might be disturbing someone who is in prayer and it is important to create an atmosphere of prayer.
- 11. Children should sit in front so that they can see and parents may explain what is happening at Mass.** However, children sometimes can't help making noise at Mass -- but it's usually the kind of noise we Catholics *love* to hear (what's better than new Catholics, especially little tiny ones?). If your child is out of control, though, or disruptive enough to distract people or makes it hard for others to hear or contemplate, perhaps take the child to the Narthex until they settle down. They don't plan it -- it's just part of being a child.
- 12. Avoid bulletin reading during Mass.** Imagine if you invited a guest to your house and before dinner (or during) they decided to read a magazine instead of talking to you. That is what is happening in God's house when you read the bulletin.
- 13. Respect boundaries others may have.** You might want to hold hands to pray, they may not. They might be sick and not want to shake during the sign of peace. These are all OK. Do not make any unnecessary judgment because they worship differently.
- 14. Bow before receiving Holy Communion.** The Eucharist is God, we show our respect with a bow of the head. This is an ancient practice that has continued until this day. Upon receiving Communion we respond with a firm 'Amen', a statement of faith and belief. Be attentive to that moment, as the procession to and encounter with Christ at the moment of Holy Communion mirrors our pilgrimage to the dwelling place of the Father and that moment when we will come face to face with Christ -- Wow!!!!
- 15. Do not receive from the chalice if you are sick.** This is an act of charity and it is not necessary to receive in order to receive the entirety of Jesus' body, blood, soul, and divinity.
- 16. Do not leave early.** We should stay to the end of the recession and the hymn that accompanies it, if there is one. While there are certainly exceptions to this guideline, most who leave early don't need to and ought not to. As one church has posted at its doors: remember who left the Last Supper early.
- 17. Pray after Mass, if you feel called to do so.** It is a good custom, though not required, to offer a prayer of thanksgiving after Mass is over.
- 18. Leave quietly.** We encourage you to visit with others, but once you are outside of the main body of the church so you won't disturb others who want to stay and pray.

We have an awesome gift. May our response in word and deed show how thankful we are to God for this gift.

NEXT SUNDAY MASS READINGS

THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

Ezra gathered the people and read to them from the book of the Law of God. He interpreted the law clearly, so that everyone understood what he had read. He then told them to go and rejoice in the Lord.

Second Reading: I Corinthians 12:12-30

Paul explains that a body is composed of many different parts, and that each part has its' own purpose and is important. He compares this to the Church, describing how we are one body composed of many members. All members should show concern for each other and understand that we are all vital to the body as a whole.

Gospel: Luke 1:1-4, 4:14-21

Luke discusses his decision to write about the events he and the other disciples had witnessed. He begins by telling of Jesus reading a passage from the book of Isaiah, where the anointed one is portrayed. Jesus finished by telling the people that they had seen that passage fulfilled in their hearing.

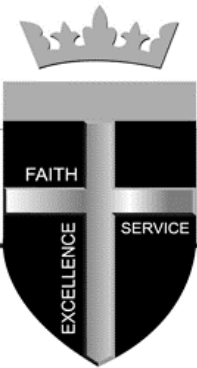
