PASTORS COLUMN

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

The 8th grade religion curriculum in our school covers the rich and sometimes bizarre history of the Catholic Church. I remind the students before we begin that while they will study areas of great growth, development and wisdom they will also learn of moments when we see clearly that it could only be the power of the Holy Spirit who guides the Church because left to human action the ship could have gone aground years ago. One of the areas we study is the first major split in the Church which is dated to 1054 and called the Great Schism.

In the year 800 Pope Leo III crowned Charlemagne, as Holy Roman Emperor. This was not well received in the Byzantine Empire which viewed the crowning by the Pope as an insult to the Eastern Emperor and the Byzantine Empire which had remained faithful under several invasions and had projected and held on to the faith for centuries after Rome fell in 476. The crowning of a Holy Roman Emperor greatly affected the relations between the East and the West rendering the Byzantine Emperor without the previous great influence in political matters. Relations were greatly strained but the actual split did not come about immediately. The tension between the empires was also felt within the Church where greater distance in culture allowed for distance in language, ritual and relations. The West exercised its influence in Western Europe and the north and west regions of the Mediterranean. The East encompassed Asia Minor, the Middle East, and Northern Africa. Due to the distancing of the empires the Byzantine Church eventually did not use Latin in prayer, ritual or ceremony. In time most of the Patriarchs of the Byzantine Church could not read Latin and the Pope in Rome did not habitually read or use Greek. In the East leavened bread was used in the Divine Liturgy (Mass) while in the West unleavened bread was used for the Eucharist. Both were valid but when the Patriarch Michael Cerularius wrote a letter to Pope St. Leo IX that the Latin use of unleavened bread was a Jewish practice and not Christian, he was basically suggesting that the Latin Rite of the Mass was not valid. Pope Leo and Patriarch Michael were not known to be on the best of terms and held one another in suspicion. Pope Leo countered that the Patriarchs were puppets of the Byzantine Emperors. Such was the nature of a not so beautiful relationship. There were also differences in the emphasis on the divinity and humanity of Jesus and the role and nature of the Holy Spirit. In the end, Pope Leo and Patriarch Michael excommunicated each other and their respective Churches. The Eastern Church became the Greek Orthodox Church severing all ties with Rome and the Roman Catholic Church. It would be 900 years later, when in 1965, Pope Paul VI and Patriarch Athenagoras I of Constantinople removed the mutual excommunications. That is a quick summary of the history.

Last week for the first time in a thousand years that history changed significantly. Pope Francis met with Russian Orthodox Church Patriarch Kirill for several hours in Cuba's Havana airport. The two ended the meeting by signing a joint declaration. Pope Francis and Patriarch Kirill came together to enhance relations in light of the plight of Christians in the Middle East and Africa. Vladimir Legoida, spokesman for the Russian Orthodox Church stated, "Although many problems in relations between the Russian Orthodox Church and the Roman Catholic Church remain unresolved, the protection of Christians in the Middle East against the genocide is a challenge that requires urgent united efforts. The exodus of Christians from the Middle East and North African countries is a catastrophe for the whole world."

Reconciliation of this historic proportion did not happen overnight. From St. John XXIII to Pope Paul VI, St. John Paul II and Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI strides have been made to achieve this. It is also that which Jesus prayed for at the Last Supper, "I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, so that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me" John 17:21. There is strength in unity. A united voice on the plight of Christians in the world from religious leaders is essential. It is good to study history, it is wonderful to see history being made.

Hope and pray your Lent observances are bearing fruit. Let us continue to pray for one another.

**NOTIFICATION OF HOSPITALIZATION
ILLNESS OR IMPENDING SURGERY**

Hospitals are required to observe confidentiality and privacy laws and are not permitted to inform us of admissions of parishioners to their facility. It is now necessary for the patient, a family member, or a health care proxy to notify the parish at the time of hospitalization. Arrangements then can be made for hospital/ health care facility visits once we are notified. Because of privacy laws we do not publish the names of the sick in our bulletin or announce them at Mass unless the patient or a family member gives us permission to do so. NEXT SUNDAY MASS READINGS

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading:
Exodus 3:1-8a,
13-15



Moses came upon a burning bush, when God called out to him. God told Moses that he had seen the suffering of his people in Egypt, and intended to lead them from their captors to a land of milk and honey. Moses asked what he should say if the Israelites should ask what God wished to be called. God replied, "I am who am."

Second Reading: I Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Paul describes how the people were led into the desert by Moses, yet many of them were struck down by God. He warns that this should serve as an example not to give in to wicked desires or we may suffer the same downfall.

Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

Jesus says that an individual's misfortune does not mean that their sins were greater than someone else's. He warns that without repenting, all sinners will meet the same end. He tells of a barren fig tree whose owner planned to cut it down. But a servant offered to give it special care for one year, and destroy it should it remain barren. This symbolizes God's patience toward us.

Lenten Regulations

Abstinence -- Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to the obligation of abstinence. Abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent. On days of abstinence, meat may not be used at all.

Fast -- Catholics over 18 and up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are the days of fasting. On these days, only one full meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.

Regarding other weekdays of Lent, participation in daily Mass and the voluntary observance of fasting is recommended. Commendable, particularly during Lent, is generosity to local, national and world programs of sharing our abundance, the traditional Lenten Devotions and all the self-denial summed up in the Christian concept of "mortification."

**OCEAN OF MERCY /HEALING
